


■ Citizen Science Projects

Jan.-March, 2017: Winter snow tracking pygmy rabbit survey. All day walking, dressed in layers are you would for skiing (5-8 miles/day). Washington Dept. of Fish and Wildlife project leader, Jon Gallie, will send an email out each Friday with the next week's schedule and meeting time/place/transportation logistics. Feb.17-20, 2017 Great Backyard Bird Count. Join this free, fun easy event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of bird populations. Participants are asked to count birds for as little as 15 minutes (or as long as they wish) on one or more days of the four-day event and report their sightings online at birdcount.org.

EACH SPRING, hundreds of thousands of shorebirds stop to rest and feed in Grays Harbor estuary on their migration northward. Coming from as far south as Argentina, these Arctic-bound shorebirds are among the world's greatest migrants. Some birds travel over 15,000 miles round trip! Tens of thousands of shorebirds feed on the open mudflats in the estuary. This concentration of birds offers people a great chance to view a number of shorebird species.
