At the social, the featured guest speaker is Audubon Washington's Christi Norman who will talk about the 2018 <u>Sagebrush</u> Songbird Survey's



accomplishments. The survey is a partnership between WA Audubon and Washington Dept. of Fish and Wildlife as a a collaborative, community

science research program. The goal is to improve knowledge of Columbia Plateau shrub-

Columbia Plateau shrubsteppe bird distribution, and to test and improve



accuracy of scientific sagebrush obligate songbirds species distribution models. Now in its 6th year, over 200 volunteers have collected field data and posted that data to eBird. The data is incorporated into the WDFW Priority Habitats and Species database, a legally-recognized source for best available science in our state. Copresenter and Wenatchee Naturalist, Richard Scranton will highlight NCWAS's leadership team of volunteers who do essential field work logistics planning and volunteer coordination. #### **■** Stewardship Project

Nov. 1, 6, 7, and/or 8, 2018. Whited's Milkvetch Habitat Restoration- 4 ways to help the BLM with emergency rehabilitation of the Washington state endangered Whited's milkvetch located just south of Wenatchee. The 2017 Spartan Fire burned through the entire population While most of the milkvetch plants survived the fire, they still need help because of the drastic changes to their habitat. Volunteers can help by clearing weeds and digging holes, watering, and planting seedlings. All told, we will be planting over 1200 plants (Whited's milkvetch and other natives) on the landscape! Volunteers will meet at the BLM office in Wenatchee (915 Walla Walla Ave) and transportation to the site will be provided. Work will involve bending, stooping, and kneeling; digging, pulling and cutting weeds; and carrying tools approximately 1/4mile. Volunteers should wear appropriate clothing and sturdy boots, bring water, lunch, sunglasses. We will provide gloves,




