




### Volunteer Pledge for Conservation







Designed K-5<sup>th</sup> hands-on nature journaling curriculum to introduce native shrub-steppe plants and animals


Developed native species and habitat restoration projects and led students in an Ag STEM Day that involves agricultural professionals in the region.
