Mara Bohman earned a 100+ hour service pin.




TALKS, PROGRAMS & FILMS:

This month, give yourself a gift of natural history education – invite a friend and attend some of these high quality and free local talks. Mark your calendars now!



Dec. 4, 6:30-7:30pm Wenatchee Library Periodical Room. **Meet the Author: Robert Michael Pyle.** Pyle grew up and learned his butterflies in Colorado, where he fell in love with the Magdalena Alpine and its high-country habitat. He took his Ph.D. in butterfly ecology at Yale University, worked as a conservation biologist in Papua New Guinea, Oregon, and Cambridge, and has written full-time for many years. His twenty-two books



include *Wintergreen* (John Burroughs Medal), *Where Bigfoot Walks* (Guggenheim Fellowship), and *Sky Time in Gray's River* (National Outdoor Book Award). He lives in rural southwest Washington State and still studies butterflies.



Thurs. Dec. 6, 6:30-7:30pm Wenatchee Library. Meet the Author: Jack Nesbit featuring his newest book, The *Dreamer* and the Doctor. In turn-of-thetwentieth-century Northwest, the lives and passions of an American physician and her Swedish naturalist husband helped share a territory on the cusp of change. 





The Burke Museum's Herbarium Image Collection has an easy-to-use online Winter Twig Identification Key that covers over 200 of Washington's deciduous trees, shrubs, and vines.
