
Thurs. Mar. 14 (7-



his book Eager: The Surprising, Secret Life of Beavers and Why They Matter, named on the 50 most notable nonfiction books of 2018 by the Washington Post. Goldfarb reveals that our modern idea of what a healthy landscape looks like and how it functions is wrong, distorted by the



fur trade that once trapped out millions of beavers from North America's lakes and rivers. The consequences of losing beavers were profound: streams eroded, wetlands dried up, & species from salmon to swans lost vital habitat. Today, a growing coalition of "Beaver Believers"—including scientists, ranchers, & passionate citizens—recognizes that ecosystems with beavers are far healthier than those without them.

Author Paul Souders about his book, Arctic Solitaire Join adventure traveler, photographer, author and barfly in training, Paul Souders on a hilarious and evocative ride of misadventures in the Arctic. In his book Arctic Solitaire, Souders shares exploits across four summers, thousands of miles of a vast inland sea, and the unpredictable Arctic wilderness—while offering an insightful look at what compels a person to embark on adventure.

documentary, Craig teams up with free diver Tanya Streeter and an international team of scientists and researchers, and they travel to twenty locations around the world over the next four years to explore the fragile state of our oceans, uncover alarming truths about plastic pollution, and reveal working solutions that can be put into immediate effect.
