


Anatomy of a Rose by Sharman Apt Russell. The inner life of flowers are unveiled as the author poetically brings together the work of botanists around the globe to reveal the science behind the flower and their pollinators. Chapters are short and can be read in any sequence.




Pacific Northwest Insects by Merrill Peterson. The introduction offers an overview to the importance of insects, where to find them in WA, and tips for identification. Excellent photos and descriptions make it fun to figure out an unknown insect.



Buzz: The Nature and Necessity of Bees by Thor Hanson. Conservation Biologist, Hanson, is a gifted writer and shows why bees are wonders to celebrate and protect. His other books to read are *Feathers* and *Seeds*, written from his island home in Pudget Sound.



What the Robin Knows: How Birds Reveal the Secrets of the Natural World by Jon Young. The author explores how a "sit spot" can teach us to decipher the communications going on between birds and animals all around us.
