CONSERVATION ADVOCACY

Mon. Mar. 2, 6-8pm The Future of the Cashmere Water Treatment Plant Property. The City of Cashmere is looking for input from the community to decide how the old lagoons should be developed. One proposal is to construct a wetland for wildlife including a side channel for salmon. Please attend the meeting and support this proposal if you can. This is an excellent opportunity to create habitat for birds and other wildlife at a convenient location for outdoor education. This will benefit the residents of Cashmere and the Wenatchee Valley for generations to come.


